Foreword from Roy Linden, BCU Commander, Devon and Cornwall Police

As the Police Commander for South Devon, it's a privilege to be able to write directly to all staff involved in safeguarding children within Torbay. As a member of the TSCP Executive and having worked in safeguarding partnerships for several years across three local authority areas, the work being conducted across Torbay is incredibly impressive despite numerous operational challenges. This quarter we are focussing on developing our Contextual Safety Framework to better understand how we coordinate the response to complex issues such as exploitation affecting the safety of children within Torbay, as well developing our collective response to mental health.

While we have seen a few changes in senior leaders both within the Police and Health partners, the commitment and momentum remains strong across all levels.

As a formal partnership we would urge staff involved in safeguarding, including those outside the core statutory partners (Local Authority, Health and the Police) to access the training available.

In a similar vein, we are also keen that we develop engagement opportunities from other agencies outside the three statutory bodies to support the delivery of this work. Please contact tscp@torbay.gov.uk with opportunities available.

Devon and Cornwall Police (DCP) worked collaboratively with the National Crime Agency and other Law Enforcement Agencies across the Region undertaking coordinated intensive activity focussing on County Lines drug supply activity between the 9th and 15th October.

The focus was on targeting those who look to supply controlled substances in our communities, exploiting or causing harm to others.

This a timely reminder for you to please submit intelligence via the portal and to encourage others to do the same, as your information and intelligence is critical to our activities.

We've been made aware of some of the changes to the Devon partnership Trust, Letter of Hope resources.

The Letter of Hope was created by people in Devon with personal experience of suicide and is intended to provide hope and encouragement to people who are facing difficult times.

With the help of Recovery Devon DPT have created two new versions of the letter: Letter for Tomorrow for young people written by young people, and Hope Letter, an Easy Read version for people with learning disabilities. There are also audio versions.

Torbay Local Child Safeguarding Practice Review (CSPR) C101

Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews - Torbay Safeguarding Children Partnership

On 18th August 2023 the TSCP published the CSPR report on child C101. The CSPR was undertaken to identify learning following C101 being admitted to hospital with multiple unexplained fractures that had been inflicted on one or more occasion.

C101 was 8 weeks old at the time.

The full report is available via the link above and has been positively commented on by National Panel in respect of learning around domestic abuse, coercive control and the proposed action plan.

CSPR reports are written in a straightforward manner that are quick to read and enable learning to be easily identified. therefore, please can we ask that you read the report and retain an awareness of the learning within your practice.

Dear colleague,

We're pleased to share with you a new report from NCMD Honorary Senior Public Health Specialist Dr Helen Duncan. <u>A thematic review of vulnerability, which</u> <u>increases the risk of poor outcomes, in infants</u> takes a look at the factors that make infants vulnerable to sudden, unexpected and unexplained death, building on the findings of NCMD thematic report **Sudden and Unexpected Deaths in Infancy and Childhood**.

The report aims to describe and evaluate the factors which may increase the vulnerability of infants to this kind of death, examining pre-existing risk factors in the child, their family or their social or physical environment, which make them more vulnerable than average to poor outcomes or harm.

Key findings in brief

- 98.1% of cases had at least 1 vulnerability factor identified from among clinical, statutory, family or social and environmental vulnerability factors.
- The most commonly occurring clinical vulnerability factors include an underlying health condition (60.9%) and the infant being described by their parents or carers as unwell on the day of death (50.0%). Over a third of cases identify smoking in pregnancy (39.1%), a recent illness (39.1%) and prematurity (37.5%).
- More than four in ten cases are known to social services (statutory domain) (43.8%), either previously or currently.
- The most commonly occurring family or social vulnerability factors, identified in over half of cases, are smoking in either parent (62.5%), mother smoking (51.6%), father smoking (51.6%), poor mental health in either parent (56.2%) and poor mental health in mother (50.0%). Over a third of cases identified previous domestic abuse (not directly related to the death) (40.6%) and smoking in both parents (39.1%). Drug misuse and alcohol misuse have been identified as separate issues; recorded for either parent they are identified in over a quarter of cases (26.6% and 26.6% respectively).
- The most common occurring environmental vulnerability factor, identified in over three quarters of cases, is not necessarily following advice and guidance on safe sleeping (78.1%) and, identified in over half of cases, co-sleeping (51.6%). In 15.6% of cases the co-sleeping was unplanned, and the carer was under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Over a third of cases identify poor home environment (45.3%) and carer under the influence of alcohol or drugs (39.1%).
